


CRANMORETOWER

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

After half a mile the footpath joins the main bridle path through the centre of the wood. There is a lake and cabin tucked away in the woods straight ahead of you. Turn right onto the mainly stony bridle path and walk up the hill following the path for about 400 meters.



There will be a footpath branching off to the left; you will see a wooden bench and some large pine trees. Follow this footpath for roughly 300 meters until you reach the outer east edge of the wood. Then turn right and follow the bridle path almost to the end of the wood to where it sweeps round to the right. Now you will be walking with the woods on your right and fields on your left as you head back towards the tower.

Go along this footpath, carrying on straight at the intersection of the central bridleway. This will bring you back to the tower.
